THANKS TO OUR DONORS

In 1991, a group of caring and concerned parents had the foresight to see what the impact of funding changes and statewide budget cuts could have on the Pleasant Hill School District. They realized additional funds would be needed to sustain programs, provide academic resources, and enrich the classrooms and extracurricular programs within our schools. Wanting to maintain the level of educational excellence for which our school district was known, they stepped in and created the Pleasant Hill Education Foundation.

The mission of the Foundation is to provide these resources with support of donors, community and alumni through innovative grants, donor-directed funds and community awareness. These resources come in many forms—from updated technology, equipment, and books to field trips and program support, which is not funded through the school district's budget. This funding enhances education and strengthens the impact teachers have on their students. We also provide college scholarships to graduating seniors that enable them to achieve their educational goals.

This fall, we awarded over \$30,000 in teacher grants and we distributed over \$11,000 in college scholarships and donor-directed funds. This puts our investment into the youth of Pleasant Hill at nearly \$190,000 over the past five years, *almost 40% more than we invested in the prior five-year period!* At the same time, we raised \$500,000 for the renovation of the much-loved Pleasant Hill Community Center, which has held many wonderful community events since its opening in 2012.

We would like to take this opportunity to ask you to join us as we look forward to the next 25 years. This community's commitment to educational excellence is just as strong as it was in 1991. Make an investment in education here at Pleasant Hill. There is still time to donate this year to make a BIG impact on next year. Join us as we continue to grow!



Lunch Buddies
